A History of

The Church of the Damascus Road

In 1996, the city of Fort Dodge, Iowa made a second bid to the Iowa Department of Corrections (having lost the first bid to Newton) to convince the IDOC to build a new prison in Fort Dodge. This time around the city's bid committee invited the clergy of Fort Dodge to join them. Three clergymen, the Reverends Marvin Jenkins, Allen Hermeier and Carroll Lang attended these meetings. Persons who had been invited to be part of the bid committee were asked to submit a component to the bid, offering the services they would provide. The clergy provided a "Spiritual Component" to the process, offering two major programs. The first was to provide an experienced parish pastor to start a prison congregation, and the second was to implement the Match Two program.

When the Iowa Department of Corrections accepted Fort Dodge's bid, Hermeier and Lang assembled laity and clergy from the area to form a steering committee. During discussion of the nature of the congregation, whether it was to be non-denominational or a part of a denomination, the Steering Committee was unanimous in stating that it should belong to a denomination. The deciding factor was that the ELCA was the only denomination offering to give financial support, so it was decided that the congregation would be part of the ELCA. The steering committee then contacted the Western Iowa Synod and invited Bishop Curtis Miller to join them in guiding the steering committee through the process of forming a mission prison congregation. Bishop Miller told the committee that the Rev. Delwayne Hahn was the Western Iowa Synod's ELCA liaison and he would be the steering committee's primary guide. Since the North Central Correctional Facility in Rockwell City was only 24 miles west, it was decided to include both sites in the plans to start a mission congregation.

The committee met several times at Christ Lutheran Church in Fort Dodge and a couple times at the synod offices in Storm Lake. The ELCA Division for Outreach had indicated an interest in starting more congregations like this, so they agreed to support this mission start-up, paying half of the mission developer pastor's salary and benefits. A call committee was formed, represented by the Bishop, Pastor Hahn, the WIS Outreach Chair, and ecumenical representatives. The call committee chair was Fr Stephen Hall+, rector of St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Fort Dodge. Several candidates were interviewed. Rev. Carroll Lang was issued the call in June 1997. He was called to begin a word and sacrament ministry at the North Central Correctional Facility on August 1, 1997. Later, when the Fort Dodge Correctional Facility opened in 1998, a word and sacrament ministry was to begin there. Although the call actually comes through the ELCA for a mission developer pastor, the actual letter of call is issued from the synod in which the mission is being developed. Salary is determined by the ELCA Division for Outreach. After the Church of the Damascus Road is self supporting, salary will be set by the Outside Church Council.

The ELCA Mission Investment Fund was instructed by the ELCA Division for Outreach to purchase a parsonage. Rev. Lang was instructed to locate a realtor and locate 3-5 possible homes in the "medium range" (\$40,000 to \$70,000). Del Hahn and Andrew Beal (Region 5 Building Consultant) came to Fort Dodge to view these homes and decided that we would need to set our range higher as the available homes were deemed inadequate by Mr. Beal. Rev. and Mrs. Lang then spent time with the realtor finding homes in the \$60,000 to \$120,000 range. After another visit from Del Hahn to view the 4 possible homes, a home was selected at a cost of \$96,000. As closing time neared, Andrew Beal had an EPA firm conduct an inspection and discovered lead and asbestos in the home. The purchase was canceled, and the Langs and the realtor began another search with a top range of \$130,000. There were none available, but the realtor had some prospects that were on the market for more than that amount, hoping that perhaps the owners would take a lower offer.

The options were narrowed to three, and then two, both for essentially the same price, but one had sewer and water service while the other had its own pump and septic tank. The first one, built in 1992, was purchased for \$153,000. The ELCA Mission Investment Fund paid for the house outright, and the agreement is that when The Church of the Damascus Road is self-supporting the house may be purchased for the same price regardless of what the market may be at the later date.

The Langs moved into the parsonage on October 11, 1997. The rest of the mighty acts of God and the activity of The Church of the Damascus Road, are they not written in the minutes and actions of the secretary and treasurer? And the ministry continues to grow.

The Church of the Damascus Road Third Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Church of the Damascus Road met on January 22, 2205 at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Fort Dodge. Father Steve Hall welcomed us and led us in prayer. A delicious meal was served by the Human Needs committee from St. Mark's. There were 37 in attendance.

Vice President Lee Kuhrt opened the meeting by introducing Pastor Carroll Lang, who then led us in devotions from I Corinthians, the first chapter.

Lee introduced the Outside Council members, CoDR volunteers, storyteller volunteers, Glenn Wooten and Jeff Roberts (former members) and Lloyd Bach (PCoA member).

Pastor Lang told us about the Volunteer Service Award we received from Governor Vilsak. He handed out pins to the volunteers. A photo of the group was then taken. He also presented the pastor's report and the 2005 proposed budget. He spoke about our AfterCare program. We are planning on having an AfterCare seminar in the Siouxland area this spring. A letter from NCCF Warden McKinney praising the work that we do there was read.

Former members: Jeff Roberts, Pocahontas, told us that he is working at Pocahontas Feeder Pig and what he has been doing. Glenn Wooten, Ottumwa, talked to us about CoDR and the affect it has had on his life.

Ernie Owen spoke to us about the Christmas card program. We gave a total of 3,000 cards to 1,250 inmates. The budget at FDCF for religious programs is \$0.00. Ernie also read e-mail thank you notes regarding the Christmas card program and the joy it brought to the inmates and staff. Ernie is now at Clarinda. What a loss for Fort Dodge.

Lee introduced Rev. Ed Nesselhuf from Prison Congregations of America (PCoA). Ed told about the KITE campaign which is designed to help support PCoA. Sending a kite means sending a message.

It was announced the fourth CoDR annual meeting would be held on January 21, 2006.

Ernie told us of Carroll's 35 years in the ministry celebrated this past year.

Judy Lang talked about the Simply Giving Program.

Greetings from Bishop Last were brought by Rev. Danette Johns.

The Reverend Fr. Peg Jackson closed the meeting with the Benediction and prayer.

Kite Quilts

Raterica gathering last fall. There were many quilts hanging around the room. They all had kites on them. After an explanation of these quilts, former inmates, prison congregations and others who work with inmates were each given one of these kite quilts to take home.

Why a kite quilt? It is a comforting thing to be wrapped in a quilt, especially if you are sick, cold or in distress. This kite quilt is meant to be used to enfold family members of men and women who are in prison. Those incarcerated leave behind spouses, children, grandparents, and other family members who are in need of love and support. They need to be wrapped in the love and grace of God as they wait for loved ones to return from prison. It is the intent of this quilt to be made and to be given to family members as a

sign that they are loved and not forgotten.

The kite design on the quilt is a trademark of Prison Congregations of America and has become a symbol of remembering Christ and those who are in prison. This quilt expands that message to include those affected by having loved ones in prison. The kite has dual meaning. For most of us it is a light, cross-shaped frame, designed to fly in a steady breeze. In prison terms, inmates send kites (memos) to get information and response from institutional staff. Prison Congregations of America uses the symbol to send a message back to inmates and families that they are not forgotten. The kite is a great symbol since the cross forms the structure, it is attached with a string, (as we are to the grace of God) and it needs wind (the Holy Spirit) to lift it into the sky.

Prison Congregations of America offers kite pins to wear to remember those in prison and now kite quilts are offered to congregations as a way to give support to the many family members who suffer grief

as loved ones are sent to prison.

If you would like to make a kite quilt for these families, contact Judy Lang as she has the pattern and more specific instructions.

Outside Council Meeting Highlights

January - December, 2005

- Officers for the year were President, Dick Hersom; Vice-President, Lee Kuhrt; Secretary, Kay Wold;
 Treasurer, Rollin Swanson.
- Pastor Jan Johnson from American Lutheran Church at Melvin has informed us that 1/2 of their mission fund goes to the Church of the Damascus Road.
- A new copier, Konica-Minolta model Di2010, was purchased for the office.
- Don Bohn, Manson, completed building a utility cart for use at NCCF, Rockwell City.
- John Everts, Kathy Hansel and Fr. Margaret Jackson have attended human needs meetings through the Upper Des Moines Opportunity, Inc. agency.
- The film "Passion of the Christ" was shown at both facilities during Holy Week and was well attended.
- In June the CoDR had a display featuring the StoryTeller program at the Fort Dodge Chamber of Commerce office. We feature a different aspect of our ministry at this location every year.
- Rev. Danette Johns of the Synod office has been looking into grant writing to obtain funds for the AfterCare Program, an extension of CoDR for ex offenders.
- Dustin Lutgen is the new Treatment Manager at Fort Dodge replacing Ernie Owen. Ernie came to our meetings several times. We hope Dustin will do the same.
- CoDR had a booth at Fall Fest in Fort Dodge in September 17. Our new banner was on display. Tomatoes donated by NCCF and other items for sale did not go well, but many people stopped by to visit and we made our presence known in the community.
- In October a "Come and See" event was held at Grace Lutheran in Fort Dodge for people, including prison personnel, who were interested in starting a prison congregations.
- Rollin Swanson reported that there was a huge group and a great time at the Prison Congregations of America benefit dinner in Sioux Falls SD on October 29. Rollin's table pledged more than \$1,000, \$700 of which was raised at his church's (Grace Lutheran) coffee hour. Pastor Carroll and Judy Lang also attended the event.
- The Outside Council had 100% attendance at the November meeting!!!
- 1,882 Christmas cards were given to the inmates at FDCF and 360 to those at NCCF. The Outside Council paid the postage; a total of \$830.86. These cards were sent to family and friends.
- Pastor Lang reported having 83 inmates at his Fort Dodge service on December 14.

— Ongoing projects:

- 1. We <u>all</u> need to become more involved in some form of fund-raising as that is one of the major responsibilities of an Outside Church Council member.
- 2 We also need to encourage all area churches to invite Pastor Lang or any of the Outside Church Council members to make presentations to their congregations and other organizations.
- 3. We must work at recruiting more ecumenical representation for the Outside Church Council. Currently we have not met our guidelines of "5 members from Ecumenical Contributing Congregations."
- 4. Again this year, Outside Church Council members were not well represented at the semiannual Inside/Outside Council joint meetings. Come on folks, although each of us is very much involved in a plethora of activities, all Outside Church Council members need to attend these important sessions. The Inside Church Council members appreciate your presence, input and wisdom.
- 2006 Goals: Continue educating the public to attend worship services, especially at FDCF, keep the financial momentum going, establish additional AfterCare centers, enlist CoDR representatives from each of the WIS conferences and recruit OC members.

From the Pastor

The Church of the Damascus Road began in August of 1997 at Rockwell City and in April of 1998 at Fort Dodge, so we are in our 9th year of ministry. I have always been amazed at the response and support we have received from congregations and individuals over the years to ensure that this ministry continues. I am grateful and thank God for all of you who are part of that support.

I am often asked whether income is sufficient, or are we operating with less than we need to maintain CoDR's ministry. There are so many factors involved in determining whether support is adequate, that I often reply, "We are at about the 97% level of support and more and more congregations are adding us to their budgets, but more support is needed if we are to extend our ministry to include reentry aftercare of

ex-offenders.'

We do all we can as a congregation to give encouragement, exhortation, and hope to the members so that when they leave they will have a renewed sense of direction and purpose to make a new life for themselves with the aid of the Holy Spirit. However, that's where the support ends for most of the members for whom we wish Godspeed. What is urgently needed is a system of support in the community to which they locate after release, and sadly, this support is almost non-existent.

Together we can turn this around. Prison authorities are becoming more and more aware of this need

and are willing to endorse responsible efforts to provide aftercare for ex-offenders.

Two back-to-back aftercare training events are planned for Saturday, March 25 from 9am to 3:30pm, and Sunday, March 26 from 2:30 to 9pm at Bethlehem Lutheran in Cherokee. A fee of \$10 per person includes a meal and an aftercare manual. Try to get 3-7 persons from your congregation and/or community

to attend the training together.

Who knows? If we move into the area of aftercare and are successful in keeping ex-offenders EX-offenders, maybe we will even begin giving PREcare in our congregations and communities to keep people from offending or at least keep them from being sent to prison. We could reduce the need for expensive prisons and fulfill the desire of Christ for us to "do to the least of these." There will always be a need for prisons, but — maybe we won't need so MANY!

FDCF Inside Council Reports

Fort Dodge Inside Council President

Our Wednesday night worship starts out with six inmates and Pastor Lang setting up our visiting room for the night. My role in setup is Altar Guild, and helping with the sound system. I take a lot of pride in making sure that everything flows smoothly for the night, for God. This is the only instance in our lives that pride is good, and not a sin. 1 Corinthians 10:31 says, "So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God."

We sing a couple of songs while people finish coming in and take their seats at 7:00. After that, Pastor Lang makes the weekly announcements that we all need to be reminded of: "Please don't talk to your neighbor during worship." Sometimes it works, and sometimes it doesn't. In Pastor Lang's announcements, he says that we just love to lose members. Usually this means that they've gone home, or transferred to another institution for treatment. We have gained and lost many members this year. It always keeps the front row fresh with enthusiasm. We are to encourage each other. Proverbs 27:17 says, "As iron sharpens iron, so one man sharpens another." A lot of our new members are Rivers inmates (violators) who usually only have a short time to do. We have been blessed with having many Rivers inmates on our Inside Church Council also.

We are a Christian community that accepts all people, just as Jesus did when he prayed for us who crucified him.

We follow a Lutheran liturgy to have some form of organization. I sing the Kyrie and play guitar with Pastor Lang's wife, Judy, who plays the piano each week. Sometimes we have a choir, and sometimes we have other special music.

Our offerings have almost tripled in the last couple of months. I started giving God back 10% of my income and was immediately financially blessed beyond belief. I couldn't contain my excitement, so I told the congregation about my joy also. If we can begin a small good habit in prison, it can carry on with us when we're released, but we have to have discipline.

Our Bible study numbers have been increasing, as well as our numbers at worship. It's such a blessing to be a part of God's plan for this place, and to be a part of his kingdom!

Holy Communion is Christ's meal. He is the host and we are the guests. Some people don't participate in Holy Communion every week, maybe because they don't feel worthy. I'm just eternally grateful that his salvation is given to us all no matter what we do or have done.

We contribute to world hunger through the CROPWalk, and the Souper Bowl each year, and sometimes through our charity list when we distribute our offerings every three months. We also sponsor a child in Chile through Children International, and always send her a birthday and Christmas donation, too. We have certain charities that we are committed to each quarter with a set amount, and then the rest is distributed by other suggestions.

I have learned a lot in the last year and a half, but I have a long way to go about more knowledge of the Bible, as do we all. I have put together a list of 52 scriptures to memorize, one each week of the year.

Brothers in Blue is always interesting to watch as it unfolds. Then as things come together in the midst of the weekend, it's usually over before you know it, and no one wants to leave. God's plan and purpose is always perfect, because he is in charge. The sooner we all realize this, the better off we will be.

The praise and worship music here is so vast and unlimited. We have at least 6 different music books, and 2 boxes full of sheet music to choose from. We have many tapes and compact discs, which the numbers keep increasing because of donations.

This year we purchased a Rogue acoustic/electric guitar, stand, strap, picks, tuner, case, capos, and 2 wireless microphones (1 handheld, and 1 lapel) from Musician's Friend and Kingdom catalog order company. We are still in need of a mixer and a snake used to get the mixer to the back of the room for better sound control. Pastor Lang is still looking for the best deal, and waiting for the right time.

I thank God for the huge number of outside volunteers, guests, and substitute pastors and accompanists that attend our worship services. It's nice to be remembered, missed, loved, and prayed for by our guests. It means to me that they don't forget us when they leave this place. In fact, some say that they look forward to the next time that they can see us again. It is this type of love that gets us through the day sometimes.

I am the Secretary of the Inside Church Council for the Church of the Damascus Road, the Proposal Committee Chairman, and the editor of both the Flash! and Echo! newsletters. This has been a good year for me and I have been blessed with these opportunities.

I attended my first council meeting on February 2, 2005. By the end of my first meeting, I knew beyond all doubt that I needed to be more included in our church. I continued to attend those meetings and on April 24, 2005 I was nominated, received my letter of call, and elected by our congregation the next Wednesday to be a member of the Inside Church council. For example, we tried to get it approved that we could be allowed to bring snacks to our meetings or have pizza at our Inside/Outside Church Council meetings. That proposal was turned down, but we do have other things in the works. We're currently trying to get it approved for us to be able to bring our Bibles to our Wednesday night worship service. We are currently not allowed to bring anything with us, because we have our worship service in the FDCF visiting room. We're also trying to start a pen-pal program. There are a lot of inmates who don't receive much mail while in prison, so we believe this would be a great program that would make it possible for those inmates to receive mail through a pen-pal program. As I said, it is in the works, and we hope that we can continue to try and make new opportunities available.

I've also had the opportunity to become the editor of both of our newsletters, the Flash! and the Echo! I became the editor in August of 2005. Since I became the editor, it has been an excellent learning experience for me. I do have some past writing experience, and my area of interest in high school was mainly business and literature. I had hoped to major in both of those areas in college, so this has been a blessing for me in more than one way. I love the experience, and I know that it will benefit me tremendously down the road in my life. My dream is to become a professional writer some day, so this is a true gift from God for me. I have learned a lot working along side a very intelligent man in Pastor Carroll Lang. This opportunity has let me see a lot of persons' love for God through their writings and artwork. The Echo! is available for inmates at NCCF, FDCF, and visitors who attend services at either facility. The Flash!, on the other hand, is sent to over 2000 people through the mail every other month. Not only are these newsletters an opportunity to make people aware of our congregation, they are also a fantastic chance to evangelize others. This is a gift that God has granted me, and I do it all for the Lord. I truly hope that these newsletters

I believe in part it is because we (the members of CoDR) have the chance to meet regularly on Tuesday evenings for Prayer Team and Bible study, and we also come together on Thursday evenings for singing, worship and fellowship with many regular volunteers and many, many outside guests. This gives us a chance to get out of our environment and fellowship with others, both from the outside and the inside, and experience the love of God.

We are thankful for this opportunity and would like to thank the members of the Outside Church Council for their support and all they do to help ensure the survival of the Church of the Damascus Road here and at Fort Dodge. Without an outside voice, this probably wouldn't be possible. We would also like to thank every congregation for their thoughtfulness and their giving spirit, for without them making us part of their missionary work there would be no CoDR. NCCF StoryTeller coordinator

As I settle into the job of being NCCF's first inmate Story Tellers Coordinator, I find myself busier and busier every month as our Story Teller readers have more than doubled over the last year.

History: Up to November of 2004, the NCCF staff oversaw the soliciting and scheduling of dads to read books to their children. This was not working well because of the inmates' work schedules not coinciding with the staff's, so the staff asked Pastor Lang if the Church of the Damascus Road could handle the whole thing. Pastor Lang agreed, since that is how the program works at FDCF. Pastor Lang asked me to coordinate the program and I accepted the challenge.

Our new method of scheduling dads to read has been more effective than before and I am pleased to report that we are overbooked with readers and have a waiting list. We can schedule ten readers each month, and lately that has grown to as many as thirteen to fifteen, and God has provided us time to get to them all in a timely manner.

I asked God, upon taking on this responsibility, to give me, and teach me new ways and give me new ideas on how to encourage reconciliation between these men and their children and families, and in his infinite wisdom God has answered my plea by now allowing the men to read books to their nieces and nephews and other children in their family circles. So, in the last year the Story Teller Program has expanded in all areas and in many ways as the men also pay a cheaper "Media Mail" postage rate, saving them money, and also paving the way for new readers to come on board. God has been, and continues to be, faithful, and I thank and praise him for it. Thank you to all the outside volunteers who come in on Saturdays and help record the dads reading.

2. Fathers select books to read to their children. Books, cassettes and envelopes are donated by outside congregations and individuals.



3. The father reads the book, recording it on cassette tape. A brief greeting may be given at the beginning and the end of the recording.



4. A brief message may be written in the front of the book.



5. A store order is filled out, except for the amount of postage, and signed.



6. The envelope is addressed to the child or in care of parent of guard-



7. Book, tape and store order are stuffed in envelope and taken to mailroom.

Inmates at the Fort Dodge Correctional

Facility and the North Central Correctional Facility in Rockwell City have monthly opportunities to select books to read to their children, recording their voices on cassette tape, and sending the book and tape to their children. The child then puts the tape in a player and opens the book and turns the pages as his Dad reads to him.

Inmates who wish to participate in this project of the Church of the Damascus Road need to sign up ahead of time. At FDCF they can do this in the chapel on Wednesday and Friday afternoons. At NCCF they need to contact David Porter or Pastor Lang to be scheduled to read.

Recording sessions are on 3rd Fridays at FDCF and on 3rd Saturdays at NCCF.

orth Central AfterCare is a group of concerned Christians in the Humboldt area that have formed a ministry to help those persons released from prison and to assist in their transition back into society. We were approved to become incorporated and have a nonprofit status as of 2004. We have a board of directors consisting of nine members and our officers are as follows: President Al Schmidke (515-332-1289); Vice-President Mary Fevold (515-332-2498); Secretary Judy Gronbach (515-332-1076) and Treasurer Sheri Peterson (515-332-1472). We continually look for new members to share in this unique ministry.

We recently concluded our year-long covenants with two former inmates and they are both doing extremely well. We signed on another man in November and that covenant is doing well also. We received gifts of money from several organizations and church groups throughout the year and hosted some coffees at a couple churches. We were able to go into the prison to conduct interviews with possible candidates, so that was a positive step with correctional facilities. We had speakers in that educated us on grant writing, chemical dependancy and county services available. Overall, we had a very successful year and look forward to continuing this special ministry with God's loving and gracious blessings!

Dear Friends,

The CoDR is vital to many men. When I attended the CoDR in Rockwell City, not only did I find a church, but I began a relationship that is life lasting. I found strangers that became my friends, and friends that became my family. They encouraged me to not only become a better person, but a man of Christ and that has changed my life. From their dedication in speaking the truth of the Word of God, their faithfulness in sharing the Word of God, and their love of God in serving as they do, is not only an encouragement, but an example of what Christ did for all.

Today I encourage everyone I meet to carry the truth of the Word of God, Jesus Christ, in their thoughts, talk and walk as they did for me and continue to do so for Christ.

It is written in John 15:13, "Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends." The Rev. Carroll Lang, the volunteers, and many staff members do this daily, and by this many many men have changed lives by coming to Christ and Christ has changed their hearts.

Testimony

You may or may not know me but my name is Andrew Hellvig and if you've seen the video, now you have a name to go with the face at the beginning! Obviously, I am an ex-inmate of the Iowa prison system. I was released in April of 2000 after spending 2.5 years in the system. I first met Pastor Lang at the Rockwell City Correctional Facility and, if you've ever been to one of his services, then I don't have to tell you why I kept returning. Pastor Lang as well as his wife Judy have a dedication and sincerity to the Church of the Damascus Road and to the inmates that is so readily apparent from the moment you walk into a service that it softens even the hardest heart. The visitors from the outside that attend the services truly touch the hearts, minds, and souls of the inmates. In short, The Church of the Damascus Road is truly a unique ministry and is invaluable to the inmates whom it serves.

Now, I could spend a lot of time telling you about how I come from a broken home, the abuse that I endured, the poverty that I grew up in or many other unpleasant circumstances of my past. I won't do that simply because I feel that every inmates story, regardless of the details, is the same—each of us has a hole in our hearts and souls. Many of us, myself included, have tried drugs, alcohol, and a variety of other methods to fill this hole. However, what I have learned is that only God, through his Son, Jesus Christ, can fill the void in our lives and that as the void begins filling, the natural reaction is to want to help others find Jesus and begin filling the lonely places in their hearts and souls with his love as well. The Church of the Damascus Road and all those involved with it taught me this lesson.

As an inmate the church services gave me hope for a better future as well as teaching me about the love of God. The visitors showed me that I was not worthless and that there are people who care. In short, this ministry began laying a solid foundation on which I could build my faith.

None of this is to say that life has been perfect since my release 5.5 years ago. The good news is that I have not been in trouble with the law since my release. I'm also married to a wonderful Christian woman who, by the way, I met through the Church of the Damascus Road. The past 3 months have been a time of renewal for me and my faith is growing stronger every day. The bad news is that we live in a fallen world and that Satan is very much alive and well. You see, shortly after my release, I began to depend on myself again rather than the strength of God and I did not take full advantage of the help that the Church of the Damascus Road and many of its visitors had offered me. I began to drink again which, incidentally, was the reason for my incarceration in the first place. I believed at the time that I had everything under control. I had a well-paying job and was accumulating all of the "things" that are supposed to make us happy. I had my new girlfriend and a home of my own. And, best of all, I was free—or so I thought. Even though I was no longer behind bars I was still in prison—a prison of isolation as I was no longer keeping in touch with family members, the church, or anyone else who had been and would be a positive influence in my life. Things got so bad that I was hospitalized several times because of my drinking and was placed in an intensive care for detoxification. I was literally killing myself. I couldn't work because of my drinking and was losing everything that God had blessed me with including my home and my wife. It was only after reaching this lowest point of my life that I returned to the foundation given to me by the Church of the Damascus Road and surrendered my life to the care of Jesus Christ.

I pray that any inmate or ex-inmate who is reading or hearing this will not make the same mistake that I made. Don't waste the time that's been given to you! You see, the 2.5 years I spent in prison were not wasted because without the Church of the Damascus Road, I would not have had a solid foundation to return to at that lowest point. The time that I DID waste was the time that I spent not being involved with the church and in developing my faith. And to any visitors, outside council members, or other friends of The Church of the Damascus Road who may be reading or hearing this, thank you for believing, not only in Jesus, but also in those of us who may seem unreachable. All of you—Pastor Lang, Judy, visitors, inmates, ex-inmates, council members, and the church itself, are making a difference.

In closing, please remember that a seed planted today may not bear fruit for years to come. But I believe that the important thing is to plant the seed and have faith that God will bring forth the fruit in His time. Lastly, if I could give some advice to any inmate, previous or current, never be afraid to ask for help. And to everyone, please continue to be involved with and support the Church of the Damascus Road, for it is truly a blessing from above.
