The rest of the book of acts unfolds the story of the formation of the church of Christ throughout the region surrounding the Mediterranean Sea.

The Unpardonable Sin

esus said the one unforgivable sin is blasphemy of the Holy Spirit. Blasphemy is to 'curse the name of the Lord." And the odds of you having committed this sin are about the same as they would be of you becoming a millionaire within the next 32 seconds.

What Jesus meant was, of course, impossible to know with 100% certainty. However, it is clear (at least it is to me) from the context surrounding Matthew 12.31,32 that he was

referring only to those Pharisees who were claiming Jesus "forces out demons by the power of Beelzebub, the ruler of demons" (Mt 12.24).

Here the blasphemy is in attributing the works of the Holy Spirit, as accomplished through Jesus, to Satan. Only those alive during the ministry of Jesus could be guilty of this unpardonable sin. They alone were living witnesses to the miracles and the power that was God working through his only begotten Son. Therefore, their testimony denied the Holy Spirit and attributed to the chief of demons the praise and glory belonging to God. Their testimony kept an entire nation from believing in their own Messiah.

While some might maintain that such a view as this, in and of itself, is inadequate, we must bear in

mind that even though Jesus stated this sin is unforgivable, he did not say it is a *sin unto* death. Indeed, the apostle John tells us that there is a sin not unto death (1 John 5.16,17). Nothing more is really known about this sin, just as nothing more is really known about the unpardonable sin.

Hebrew 10.26 and 1 John 5.16,17 are often used in regard to sermons on the unpardonable sin. However, a close look at the full context from which these two passages are taken reveal no obvious connection. Only John's mention of a sin not unto death would seem to apply, given that Jesus said the unpardonable sin is not forgiven "in this age nor in the age to come." (Of course, he could have meant the time of judgment, but I see that more as an event than as a period we can classify as an age.)

It is logical, then, that those who were attributing the works of the Holy Spirit to Satan were hard-hearted and incapable of being forgiven, having rejected God's forgiveness by their own choices. We can see this in the reality of their witness. That is, these men were eyewitnesses to indisputable facts and yet cold-heartedly rejected the truth. And for that these men cannot be forgiven in this age or even in the next.

Regardless of which view a person adapts, one cannot escape this reality: The unpardonable sin was attainable only during the earthly life of Christ. We can know this by the fact that more is not said or taught on the subject. Surely, if this were to be a concern for future generations of the church, warnings would have been given in the books of the New Testament, especially by Paul. Yet nothing exists on this topic except what was spoken of by Jesus as recorded in Matthew 12 and repeated in Mark 3 and Luke 12.

We need to keep sight of the fact that Jesus taught little about the Holy Spirit during the course of his ministry. This is because the Spirit was in him. We read of this in Matthew 3.16: When he had been baptized, Jesus came up immediately from the water; and behold, the heavens were opened to him, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on him. Notice how the heavens were open only to Jesus and only Jesus saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove.


While the Spirit has been at work in the world since the very beginning (see Genesis 1.2), it was not until Pentecost that God poured His Spirit out upon all of mankind (see Joel 2.28-32; Acts 2.1-39). As we just saw, the Spirit came down to Jesus, which indicates that he was not already in the world. Again, the Spirit had been at work in the world but he was not yet *in* the world. That happened at Pentecost, just as the prophet Joel had predicted.

Conclusion

When we begin to put together what we have reviewed here, it seems perfectly obvious to me that each of us need to worry about whether or not our sins have been forgiven and whether or not our salvation is real, rather than worrying about a sin that cannot be forgiven in this life nor in the next.

Since sin is a conviction of our separation from God, if we are guilty of any sin in our lives, we are going to know it. As it says in Hebrews 10.22, let us draw near to God with a sincere heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled to cleanse us from a guilty conscience (NIV). Therefore, if you question whether or not you have committed the unpardonable sin then that's probably the one sin you are not guilty of.

And now you know why.



Trust in the Lord and do good; dwell in the land and enjoy safe pasture (Psalm 37:3). And when you stand praying, if you hold anything against anyone, forgive him, so that your Father in heaven may forgiven you your sins (Mark 11:25).

Do not say, "I'll pay you back for this wrong!" Wait for the Lord, and he will deliver you (Proverbs 20:22).


And this is my prayer: that your love may abound more and more in knowledge and in depth of insight (Philippians 1:9).

Dear GOD: I didn't think orange went with purple until I saw the sunset You made on Tuesday. That was cool. Love, Sara



This time I will do my best; Never veer from the path. Life is just a test — You do the math.


