

CoDR's Tenth Anniversary!

n 1997 Pastor Carroll Lang was extended a call from the Western Iowa Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America to develop a prison congregation called The Church of the Damascus Road.

He began this ministry on August 1st in the North Central Correctional Facility in Rockwell City. Pastor Lang started by having Bible studies and by the end of the month was conducting worship services.

When the Fort Dodge Correctional Facility was completed, Pastor Lang and Judy participated in the "40 Winks in the Klink" fundraiser and open house. Inmates started arriving in late April of 1998 and Bible studies and worship services were started by the first part of May 1998.

We are planning a special event to commemorate the tenth anniversary of CoDR. Therefore, the Annual Meeting of The Church of the Damasacus Road has been moved from its regular time in January to a new time — November 10, 2007. It will be held in St. John Lutheran Church in Pomeroy, Iowa, on Hwys 4&7.

The Outside Council of The Church of the Damascus Road (Dennis Booth, Lytton, president) has appointed a committee to start planning a 10th Anniversary Celebration at our Annual Meeting.

We are still in the planning stages. More information will be coming out later. But we want you to know the date and location so you can plan on coming. We are hoping to fill the church with many former members, supporters, and volunteers!



Reentral It's a Ministry, Not a Program

s we continue to grow, the network of support and capacity to serve does the same. On July 2^{nd} , Pastor Lang, Judy and I met with Ken Quintus of On Common Ground Ministries. This Ministry in north central Iowa is providing housing for a number of men who are making changes of their own accord. A by-product of these relationships is the ability to serve those whom we cannot serve on our own. For instance I have a letter on my desk from a gentleman in Las Cruces, New Mexico, who has been writing to Ken. On the days when I think that things are not moving quickly enough, I just read something like the above paragraph and think *wow* — "*in a year and a half!*"

Trainings: We have a number of Reentry AfterCare trainings coming up in the next few weeks, so once again our number of AC Communities is going to be growing very quickly. August 4 we held a training session at the Sixth Judicial District just in time, as their first participant arrived before the class was done. Upcoming dates August 19 at Epworth, August 25 in Waterloo, and September 15 in Davenport. Pending dates exist in Council Bluffs, Sioux Falls, Newton, and others. We also did a Marriage Matter Mentor Couple Training on August 18 in Fort Dodge.

Sponsorship Meetings: We now have a team of sponsors who are generating some really good applications through "Women at the Well" at Mitchellville. I attended the Inside Council Meeting on July 31to begin the process of rebuilding our foundation of sponsors at Rockwell City. This is the process of identification that is crucial to the very beginning step of the screening process. As these things come together we will be generating more applications, and filling the Community Teams who are awaiting participants.

Inside/Out Dads: The first class finished with great reviews in Newton and the identification process for the next class has begun. The first class at Rockwell City has been accompanied by some great feedback, and again, as it was in Newton we are identifying more AC Participants as well as those who can be served by MM Mentors, assisted by DHS, and other agencies. Fort Dodge Inside/Out Dads has yet to begin, but it will be soon!

Placements: In the month of July Reentry AfterCare placed three ladies and six men, for a total of nine reentries for the month. Also we were active in eleven assists, meaning that we assisted folks by connecting them to the resources in the community in which they planned to locate. It appears that we will be doubling that number in the month of August, and the cool thing is we will have more that enough AC Teams to support this. We will finally get caught up in placing participants into Community AfterCare Teams that have been waiting on participants.

Reaching out: Almost a year ago we had an AC Participant come to us from a facility in Michigan. This man has overcome some of the largest obstacles that most of us could ever dream of, and in his tracks came others. I'm now working on releasing a man back to Iowa from SD, and one from New Mexico, as well as working with other states to deal with detainees, child support and other obligations.

Presentations: On July 15 Rollin Swanson and I went to Badger Lutheran and did a presentation on The Church of The Damascus Road, Reentry AfterCare, Inside/Out Dads and a the big picture on Reentry. Also we were blessed to raise over nine hundred dollars that will be financial support for helping others during the reentry process. While remembering this day please keep in mind former

member Andrew Hellvig who was a member of The Church of The Damascus Road, and was taken from this world over a year ago during an ATV accident. His wife Sara continues to support our ministry, and is working with CoDR to make sure that Andrew is remembered in our congregation.

The Reducing Recidivism and Second Chance Act of 2007: While some of you my have heard me speak of this piece of legislation, originally called Sen. Bill #1934, it is now in Judiciary Committee and needs our support. Please take time to research this bill and you will see that it runs in tandem with our model of Reentry.

On July 25 I went to Cedar Rapids to participate in an Employment Resources workshop through the ICN. This event was held at over four hundred locations, with over four thousand people in participation. This was a great global view of faith based and community based organizations that are working together all over the nation, networkeing with the resources and support of Government offices and agencies. It is great to get opportunities like this to enforce that our model of reentry is one of great structure. It's actually pretty simple, "working together works". The very effective bi-product of bringing people together for trainings like this is the capacity to serve always increases in the room itself. Present a this workshop were a number of FBCOs and CBCOs along with Department of Corrections Staff, all coming together to give their best effort to achieve a common goal. The group that I met with is going to begin holding monthly meetings to bring others to the table, such as the employers and other community leaders. The next meeting will be September 10 in the Cedar Rapids area. Please contact me if anyone has an interest in attending.

Reminder: We have a number of training events coming up in the weeks to come. These activities are raise awareness and recruits individual servants who are the backbone of the success this great ministry has experienced. So please let others know who might be interested in ANY part of the mission of Reentry AfterCare and the supportive outreach ministries we are involved with.

THANK YOU! So much is being accomplished! Growing pains? Yes! But to see so many peoples' lives being changed through the Churches, and the ministries make every pain a milestone when we overcome them. NONE of this would happen without our army of dedicated volunteers. Blessings and Peace to everyone who has served this great ministry in any way! You are making a difference! Thank you!
