

The Facilities

The central facilities of the club include a full three-season clubhouse with kitchen, bathrooms and showers facilities, and a grand meeting room for indoor gathering. We also have an open-air pavilion for major gatherings, picnics, and family dinners. The pavilion is equipped with lights, a several gas grills and many picnic tables for the member's convenience.

Boating facilities include a boat ramp, two gin poles for masts and a forklift for general heavy work. We hire a crane to lift boats for Haul and Launch weekends. We also have two pumpout stations for members and guests to use.

The club grounds include a playground for the kids, volleyball area, and access to the lake, small camping area and a long term parking area for people out on cruise.

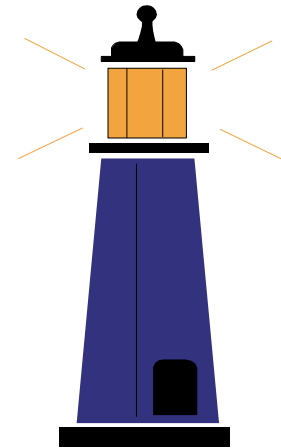
Directions

From Rochester and West: Route 104 East to Williamson, then turn left onto Route 21 North. About 4 miles ahead, go straight at 4-way intersection onto dirt road - Hamilton, St Ext. Clubhouse will be at the top of the first hill to the right.

From Oswego and East: Route 104 West to Williamson, then turn right onto Route 21 North. About 4 miles ahead, go straight at 4-way intersection onto dirt road - Hamilton, St Ext. Clubhouse will be at the top of the first hill to the right.

We also publish a *PYC Log* book for membership lists, a club history and by-laws, and a monthly newsletter called the *Lake Soundings*.



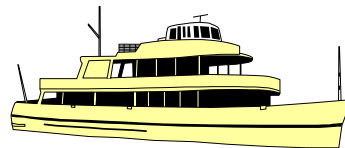
The Boating
