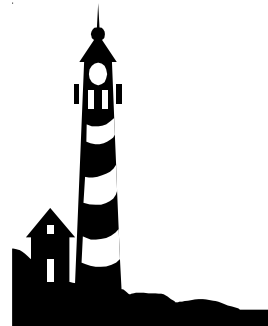
Dear Boater-friends!

➤ **Who:** Anyone who wants to have a good time. This is for all children old enough to wear a PFD and who know how to use a “super soaker”. No age limits.

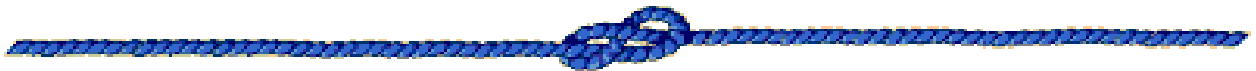
➤ **Rules:** At least one child per dingy with an adult. If the Foley clan brings more children we will just have to recruit more adults or double up the children.

Turbinia

The Turbinia, designed and built by Charles Parsons in 1894, was the first vessel in the world to be powered by steam turbines. She made a spectacular first appearance at Queen Victoria’s diamond jubilee in 1897, where she was seen dashing across the reviewing parade of ships, with the Prince of Wales and Prince Henry of Prussia and Queen all watching. It was a brilliant marketing ploy. A Navy boat dispatched to intercept the Turbinia was hopelessly left in her wake. As it turned out, both Princes were excited and asked for a return run!

The Turbinia was 104ft long, only 9ft beam, with a 7ft draft. She was powered by a 3-stage Parsons steam turbine, rated at 2000 HP, which propelled her to a world speed record of 35 knots (40mph). To harness the turbine’s power, the Turbinia was equipped with 2 propeller shafts, each with three 18” diameter by 24” pitch propellers. The introduction of turbine engines in ships of all types swiftly followed.
