Notes from the Engine Room.....

Hello, everyone;

This article is aimed at getting everyone prepared for work days in May and June. As I said last month, we are using a different approach to work days in an attempt to be a little more "member friendly" while still getting all the jobs done. This approach is designed to let each member select a type of work he or she most enjoys or is most capable of and should help each of us be ready to pitch in when we arrive for our work day.



How it works

We are not using the alphabetical assignment procedure this time. Several members have agreed to head up specific projects or groups of like projects. These project leaders are listed below, along with the types of work they are responsible for and the day on which the work will be done. Simply take a look at the list of projects we will be doing in May and June, and pick the work you would most like to participate in. Call the project leader and get your name on his or her list. First come, first served, since each project requires a limited number of people so if you wait to sign up you might not get the job you want. 2004 PYC Launch Job Assignments Saturday April 24th and Sunday April 25th

NOTES: If you do not see your name on this list and want your boat launched, call Terry Wolfe at (315)986-1317 ASAP.

AM shift runs from 7:00AM to 1:00 PM -- PM shift runs from 12:00PM to 6:00PM Lunch will be served between shifts

Launch Guidelines:

- 1. Meet at least 5 minutes before your shift starts. Let's not have the crane waiting for us!
- 2. Have your boat ready before your shift. (30 foot tag lines fore and aft Check and/or Close the Thru-Hulls!)
- 3. Keep slings out of the dirt. Dirty slings scratch hulls. Wash them if needed.
- 4. Some of the crews are short handed, help out when you can, but don't ignore you own assignment.
- 5. Safety issues: Do not walk or stand under a boat while it is in the air.
 - Do not walk or stand and a boat while it is in the an. Do not walk or stand between the crane operator and signal man. Don't lift more than you are able, ask for help when needed. Sling crews MUST wear hard hats. Keep your eyes open and use common sense.

Tools required: gloves, small hand tools, wrenches, etc., power drills and various bits including screwdriver bits, circle saws, hammers, sawhorses, extension cords, shore power outlet adaptors for standard A.C. plugs.

Dock Replacement- May 15

Tools required: gloves, small hand tools, wrenches, etc., power drills and various bits including screwdriver bits, circle saws, hammers, sawhorses, extension cords, shore power outlet adaptors for standard A.C. plugs.

North Shore Clean-up- May 8

Dick Darrow, team leader

Tools required: gloves, chainsaw(s), lawn rakes, garden rakes, sharp cutting tools for cutting heavy rope or lines (we want to remove all the old tires from the docks this year.)

Special requirement- a lawn tractor mounted tiller to be used to finish cleaning up roadside clumps and divots prior to raking and seeding. Not all of these jobs are heavy jobs, some require no more than picking up sticks or being able to spray poison ivy killer or weed killer.

Building Projects- May 8

Dave Weagley, team leader

Tools required: gloves, hand tools for carpenter work, (siding, soffets on clubhouse) mechanical hand tools needed for servicing gas grills. Plumbing tools to fix faucets, valves, leaks etc. **Special require-ment- power washer to clean exterior of clubhouse.** Someone who can volunteer a pressure washer will save the club having to rent one.

Building Projects- May 15

Roger Carr, team leader Same as May 8, Roger and Dave will coordinate which jobs and work days.

Clubhouse Spring Cleaning- May 15

Cindy Kukuvka, team leader

Project: Spring cleaning of inside of club house; refreshing of formal plantings around the building and in some other areas. Tools required: any special cleaning tools you may have, small gardening equipment (trowels, etc.)

Dock Repair- May 8

Eric Matteson, team leader

Tools required: mechanic's tools, including medium and heavy wrenches; heavy hammers, pry bars, carpenter's hammers, power hand drills for deck repair, circle saws, sawhorses, extension cords, adapters for shore power outlets.

Pavilion Cleanup and Repair, May 15th

Brian McCarthy, team leader

Wash down pavilion deck and weather screens, replace screen pulls and repair screen pull hardware. Tools required: gloves, utility knives, carpenter tools, power drills, screwdrivers.
