REFLECTION Could You Be Convicted? by Guillermo de Carndonagh

I was reading a small novella recently, the account of the persecution of Catholic Christians in a fictitious South European country at the beginning of this century. The story itself was nothing special but the idea is worth considering. Could you be convicted of being a Catholic Christian? If the ----tonistas gained power and adhering to Catholicism was made a crime could you be convicted?

Material evidence

If they searched your person would they find a well-worn medal or scapular? Or a shiny gold trinket that a skilled lawyer could dismiss as no different than the apparel of the pagan's selling dope on street corners.

When they searched your house would they find a statue or a Crucifix prominently displayed? Or would they find some inconspicuous display of semi-religious items that a skilled lawyer could dismiss as commonplace bric-a-brac.

When they checked your financial records, would they find significant contributions? Would they find any contributions to religious organizations and charitable causes? Or are you a stick a dollar in the basket and run person making no real sacrifice and leaving no record? Would your lawyer be able to show that your entertainment expenses are so much greater than any church or charity related contributions that you could hardly be considered a serious Christian?
